July 9 *Mt. Whitney to Yosemite, A Lifetime Walking the JMT/PCT*, Cheryl Pytlarz and Frances Reneau

In 1977, as high school graduates, we two independent gals, Cheryl Emrich (Pytlarz) 17 years old and Frances French (Reneau) 18 years old, set out alone to hike over 350 miles over 6 weeks along the High Sierra in California, which included all of the John Muir Trail, additional mileage on the PCT, and a dozen day hikes on layover days. Not having quite finished as planned, life intervened, and 41 years later in 2018 we reunited to complete the last week of our youthful ambition.

August 13 *Adrienne Jaeger – Former National Park Service Ranger* Adrienne S. Jaeger will talk about her experiences working as a ranger at Mount Rushmore National Memorial in 2016, the centennial anniversary of the National Park Service. Come learn about being a park ranger, living in the Black Hills, and what it was like to protect one of the most iconic works of art in the world.

September 10 *“Shooting Fall Colors”* - Scott Pearson Photographer and biologist Scott Pearson will present a program on how to get your camera to record the same vibrant colors your eyes see in the fall. Scott's photos have won numerous awards and have appeared in Lake Superior Magazine.

October 8 *Jeff Nania, author of Figure Eight: A Northern Lakes Mystery.* Speaker for this month. His first career was in law enforcement serving in many roles. A lifelong outdoorsman, Jeff's interest in natural resources led him to a new career founding and leading the Wisconsin Waterfowls Association Wetland Restoration Field Team, restoring hundreds of wetlands across the state. Through this work, he became nationally recognized as one of the pioneers in the ecosystem-based approach to restoration. Jeff was named by Outdoor Life Magazine as one of the nation's 25 most influential conservationists, was Wisconsin Wildlife Federation's Conservationist of the Year and has received the National Wetlands Award, Leopold Restoration Award, and Wisconsin Outdoor News Lifetime Achievement Award. This meeting will be held at Conserve School with a dinner preceding the presentation.

Work Party Agonikak Trail May 2019

Eighteen volunteers braved the rainy weather and cleaned-up the Agonikak Trail of all the fall and winter debris. They covered 12 miles of trail. The bugs did not show this year because they all drowned. That makes four years of unbugginess (special UP word). After the work, we all enjoyed pizza provided by Wilderness Lakes Trails and shared stories of the day. Mainly complaining about my weather forecasting. I opted not to cancel the work party as the radar showed the front would pass before we started and we would be rain free until we were done. The first part was correct!

This was our sixth Agonikak work party. Back in 2008 we identified the restoration of the Agonikak National Recreation Trail as a possible public service project for the Fish and Game Club. Once it became part of the trail system being developed by Wilderness Lakes Trails in cooperation with the Town of Watersmeet and the U.S Forest Service, our involvement became critical. Watersmeet agreed to be a sponsor so we could get a grant, but was not in a position to provide maintenance. The USFS agreed that they would be willing to enter into a maintenance agreement with WLT and the F&G Club similar to what we currently do with the hiking and ski trails. In May 2010, the F&G Club approved a three way agreement with the USFS and WLT. We agreed to provide volunteers with the USFS and WLT providing equipment and financial support to maintain the trail.



The Wilderness has 50 backcountry campsites accessible only by foot or paddle boat. It takes about 180 volunteer hours to visit all of the sites to survey their condition so Forest Service personnel can service them for the season. Our volunteers look for dangerous trees, clean up dry flammable debris around the fire rings and note whether the latrines need relocating. This volunteer opportunity is a great way to ring in the summer season each year.

protection and preservation of the environment upon graduation from the college or university of their choice.

Pazia Peterson, the LaChance award winner, will be attending Northland College in the Fall, where she will be majoring in Environmental Science and minoring in Outdoor Education/Administration. Pazia is a self-reliant, independent young woman who has developed a "passion for the environment", as stated in one of her recommendation letters. Her love for the land and great outdoors came from all the time she spent on her grandparents' hobby farm, where she lived for most of her life. She was also influenced by her aunt who taught an outdoor ecology class at the Conserve School as an intern, and by a summer shadowing course she took at Trees for Tomorrow. At Northland Pines High School she was extremely active in numerous school activities, many of which had a mentoring aspect to them. Her goal for the future is to return to this area in some environmental education capacity, perhaps even at the Conserve School.

Noah Miller, the Fish and Game Club award winner, will be attending Montana State University in the Fall, majoring in Environmental Science and minoring in Political Science. Noah was second in his class at Northland Pines and a member of the NPHS National Honor Society. Noah is in Costa Rica this summer, where he is a volunteer for the Sea Turtle Conservation Program. Noah attended the Conserve School for one semester his junior year, and by all accounts this was a life-altering experience for him. Rather than focusing on hockey, he began devoting his time and energy to promoting environmental stewardship. He spent time during the summers of 2017 and 2018 doing volunteer work to control invasive species within the Sylvania Wilderness Area. He did volunteer work at the Land O' Lakes Community Garden, and helped design a school garden at NPHS through the Farm to School Program. Sustainable farming worldwide became one of his interests and passions. But most importantly, he found the power of his own voice when he was selected as one of 40 young adults (only 5 from Wisconsin) to fly to Washington to lobby for the protection of the Boundary Waters Canoe Area through an organization called Kids for the Boundary Waters. Meeting with highly ranked members of the United States Congress in this lobbying effort was extremely inspirational for Noah, and has started him on a path towards environmental activism. He believes that one voice can make a difference. Noah's goal for the future is to inspire others in the fight for protection of the earth's natural resources and public lands, and to promote sustainable farming worldwide.

How Ice Melts on our Lakes

A description of how lake ice melts away appeared on the web blog "Air Mass", hosted by the Star Tribune's Bill McAuliffe. Ed Swain, of the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency describes the process of freezing and thawing lakes.

In the late fall, the lake loses heat to the atmosphere, and then on a day or night when the wind is not blowing, ice forms. The ice gets thicker as long as the lake can continue to lose heat.

In most Januaries and Februaries, snow both reflects sunlight and insulates the lake. With a thick snow layer, the lake neither gains nor loses heat. The bottom sediment is actually heating the lake water slightly over the winter, from stored summer heat.

Around March, as the air warms and the sun gets more intense, the snow melts, allowing light to penetrate the ice. Because the ice acts like the glass in a greenhouse, the water beneath it begins to warm, and the ice begins to melt FROM THE BOTTOM.

When the ice thickness erodes to between 4 and 12 inches, it transforms into long vertical crystals called "candles." These conduct light even better, so the ice starts to look black, because it is not reflecting much sunlight.

Warming continues because the light energy is being transferred to the water below the ice. Meltwater fills in between the crystals, which begin breaking apart. The surface appears grayish as the ice reflects a bit more light than before.

The wind comes up, and breaks the surface apart. The candles will often be blown to one side of the lake, making a tinkling sound as they knock against one another, and piling up on the shore. In hours, a sparkling blue lake, once again!

Another Successful TREE GIVEAWAY!

The club teamed up again this year with the US Forest Service Toumey Nursery to give away trees at the on Saturday of Memorial Day Weekend. This year the nursery provided 2,700 trees. In 4 years an amazing 12,300 trees have been distributed to the public!

Our sincere thanks goes out to the management and the team at the nursery for the beautiful trees. Many thanks to Joe LoMastro for coordinating the event and to Steve Wilkinson for helping Joe distribute them at the event.

Toumey nursery is located in Watersmeet, MI and currently has 66 acres dedicated to planting. The number of trees grown in the nursery is determined by each National Forest's yearly projected needs. At full capacity it is capable of producing 12 million saplings per year. The nursery includes 3 greenhouses and 2 hoop houses where the seedlings are started. The bare root trees made available for the Summer Launch are a culmination of two to three years of hard work and intensive management by nursery personnel. Tours can be arranged for a wide range of groups by contacting their office at 906-358-4523.

We look forward to partnering with the Forest Service again for this popular event in future years.
